## What is Anti-D Injection?

Anti-D Injection is used to keep infections away. It prevents antibodies from developing when someone with Rh-negative blood obtains a transfusion of Rh-positive blood, or when a woman has Rh-negative blood and her baby is Rh-positive during pregnancy. In pregnancy-related issues, Anti D Injection is used for Rh prophylaxis. Incompatible transfusions in Rh-negative people transfused with blood components including Rh-positive red blood cells are also approved (RBCs). It's also used to treat immune thrombocytopenic purpura, a disorder in which the quantity of circulating platelets drops, making bruising easier.

#### **How To Use**

- Anti-D Injection will be given to you by your doctor or nurse. Please do not self-medicate.
  The injection is administered into a muscle, usually the upper arm.
- If your baby is Rh D positive, you will be offered an anti-D injection at 28 weeks of pregnancy and then within 72 hours after birth.
- Before using it, talk to your healthcare provider if you have any blood clotting issues or if

you have just received or plan to receive a vaccination.

## When it comes to infection prevention,

- Anti-D Immunoglobulin Injection is a kind of antigen (also known as an antibody). When a patient with Rh-negative blood receives a transfusion of Rh-positive blood, it helps to prevent antibodies from developing.
- When a woman has Rh-negative blood and the infant has Rh-positive blood, it can also aid throughout pregnancy. It is given to you on a regular basis during the third trimester of your pregnancy. This is because small quantities of blood from your baby will most likely flow into your bloodstream during this time. It should only be given by or under the supervision of a doctor.

#### **How Does It Work**

Anti-Rh D immunoglobulin is one of the immunoglobulin class of medicines. It eliminates or nullifies any foetal rhesus-D positive red blood cells that penetrate the rhesus-D negative maternal bloodstream following childbirth, abortion, or any other pregnancy-related mishap or intervention that could result in placental haemorrhage.

**Anti-D Injection - Side Effects** 

The majorities of side effects are minor and will go away as your body adjusts to the medication. If they don't go away or you're concerned, see your doctor.

- Fever
- Headache
- Tenderness at the Injection site
- Pain at the Injection site
- Feeling of discomfort

# What does it imply to have an anti-D antibody?

If you don't have RhD, your blood will be tested for antibodies that destroy RhD-positive red blood cells (anti-D antibodies). If anti-D antibodies are found in your blood during pregnancy, your unborn child is at risk of contracting rhesus disease.

# What is the purpose of Anti D Injection?

Anti-D injections are required to prevent the disease Rhesus. This can help women prevent a condition known as sensitisation. This is a syndrome in which a woman with RhD-negative blood develops an immunological reaction to RhD positive blood.

# When should Anti-D Injection be administered?

If your baby is Rh D positive, it will be given as an injection at 28 weeks of pregnancy and within 72 hours after birth.
